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




The Roman World: How Long to Rome?



Who's Who: Julius Caesar, Augustus, Herod

- Julius Caesar : his death set off
 Rome's Civil Wars
- Augustus: Roman world's ruler at the birth of Christ. Won Civil Wars.
- Herod: appointed "King of the Jews." Ruled Judea, a client state of Rome. Did not rule Ephesus.





- power
- In the hinterland: "no one sees sculptors, painters, or perfumers or money changers or poets."

He might have added: "or hairstylists."




A City Had the Good Life

- Aqueducts: Water in an arid climate
- All-weather roads
- Temples
- Libraries, theaters, an odeion
- Monuments, arches, tombs
- A forum or two, and basilicas
- Baths
- Amphitheaters and stadia
- Skilled craftsmen for buildings, sculpture, paintings, decoration

Quick History of E.



- Much, much older than Greeks and Romans—
 inhabited 70 centuries ago. Excellent harbor for trade.
- Its "founding spot" is the Ayasoluk Hill outside of today's classical city, in Selcuk.

The Roman Impact on Ephesus under Augustus

- Augustus elevated it to be the capital of Rome's new "Asia" province.
- Boom- time. Trade and wealth flowed.
 Beautiful townhouses for the rich.
- Tourism flourished: The Temple of Artemis
- Two new aqueducts were built or extended.
- With water, the population could grow.

Ephesus to Rome: Shortest Route




By Land (and some) Sea: 30 days. 18 stops

Aqueducts: 600-plus Aqueducts have been identified in the Roman World

- About 90% of an aqueduct was underground
- The cost of building an aqueduct high: perhaps \$300,000 per mile. A similar pipeline in modern Australia has cost about 20% of this.
- The aqueduct business was complicated: first find a reliable source. Capture it. As it flows along, protect the water from animals and water robbers. Deliver it into to the city, catching the water at its destination. Distribute the water within the city.

New Aqueducts

 The Aqua Iulia with three pipe lines made of clay. Eventually ran 24 miles, over 22 bridges and 3 tunnels.









What Happened to Ephesus


- Harbor silted up. There went the fortunes made from trading with the Orient
- Earthquakes and fires struck
- Invasions from outsiders like the Goths.
 Roman Army could no longer defend it.
- Slowly became a small village; completely abandoned in the 15th c.
- Rediscovered only in the 19th c, by Austrian and British archeologists


